### OVERVIEW OF THE BOOK

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### **PAUL, THE AUTHOR**

- writing from prison, facing possible execution
- his message has reached all of Rome
- has deep affection for the Philippians
- thanking them for their generosity

### THE CITY OF PHILIPPI

- a town in northern greece made up of both Jews and Gentiles, mostly lowerclass.
- also occupied by wealthier Romans who were there to colonize, bringing the culture of Rome
- very culturally, religiously, ethnically, and socioeconomically diverse

### THE CHURCH IN PHILIPPI

- Likely the first church established by Paul on his missionary journeys
- Experiences conflict and division

### THEMES OF THE LETTER

- Joy and rejoicing, even in suffering
- Advancement of the Gospel, specifically through unity and holiness
- Longing for the return of Christ

# MORD STUDY

### DOKIMÁZŌ, G1384 (DOK-IM-AD'-ZO)

 to test, examine, prove, scrutinize (to see whether a thing be genuine or not), as metals

### PAUL, PETER, AND JAMES

They all rejoiced in suffereing because they understood trials would "prove" or "test" the genuineness of their faith (pistis), which means trust or belief. As a goldsmith heats gold to bring impurities to the surface so he can skim them away, trials bring our weaknesses to the surface so Christ can transform us. A goldsmith knew he was finished purifying the gold when he could look over it and see his reflection. In trials, God can prove that he has placed in us true faith, which is the ability to trust and believe Him even when our circumstances tell us otherwise. It is not that we must prove ourselves in trials, but that God is proving the reality of Christ in us.
