
CHAPTER FOUR

PROVISION FOR MISSION

It was common for various religious leaders to charge for their teaching, but Paul was careful not to misrepresent Jesus by charging his hearers for the good news about him. There were times he served as "tentmaker" to support himself as he ministered, but in other cases, he relied on the giving of others. Because the Philippians had been so deeply changed, they played a part in sending Paul and helping sustain his missionary journey in order to bring the gospel to others.

CHAPTER FOUR

- From prison, Paul shares he is content in any circumstance because Christ gives him strength.
- God supplies for the needs of those who sacrificially give for the sake of the gospel.
- Paul expresses the trans-local nature of the gospel, which is able unify all kinds of people in all kinds of places into one family with God as Father.
